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2D Drawing to 3D Making


Objectives

Negative	The empty areas around and between objects
space	in a picture.
Grid method	Dividing a picture into squares to help draw it
	accurately and maintain proper proportions.
Scaling up	Making a drawing or artwork larger while
	keeping the same proportions and details.
Collage	Creating art by sticking together different
	materials like paper or fabric.
Structure	The way artwork is organised or built, like the
	skeleton that holds everything together.
Tonal value	How dark or light colours are in a piece of art,
	this helps to create depth or contrast.
Sculpture	Creating art in three dimensions.
Mark making	Creating lines, shapes and patterns using pencils, pens or brushes.
